



Everyhody Get Outside! The Forest School at Rye Nature Center

Nature, science, and conservation education are at the heart of FRNC's mission. We strive to create programs that are exciting and encourage a love and appreciation of nature. We do this by utilizing experiential, place-based, and inquiry-led activities, an approach that has been successful in our Forest Preschool and after-school classes, as well as our summer camps. From small hands to adult hands, every program that we have stems from our work and understanding of our 47-acre forest.

In 2023, we will rebrand our educational philosophy and teaching style as The Forest School at Rye Nature Center. Whether it's a school study tour, a preschool class, a summer camp day, or a hands-on workshop for adults, our community is learning through our forest. The Forest School at Rye Nature Center encapsulates the idea that we all benefit from long-term exposure to nature no matter our age.

All preschool classes will adopt the Forest Preschool model. We are now accepting applications for the 2023-24 school year. Offerings include one-, two-, three-, and five-day sessions with the option to walk to or from other local preschools.

We are revamping our afterschool programs so that each several-week session focuses on a new theme like survival skills, marine animals, or animal tracking in winter. This gives students an opportunity to get outside and get active after long school days indoors.

We will host a series of workshops and lectures to help deepen or discover your relationship with the natural world. Topics may include anything from tree and bird identification, to mushrooms and sustainable gardening.

Our seasonal public programs will return with maple sugaring, spring walk, and build your own birdhouse. 2023 will also welcome back "My Naturalist and Me" previously known as "Mommy- or Daddyand-Me."



Conservation Corner

Boots on the Ground: A New Conservation Crew

2022 brought a new conservation team to FRNC! Land Stewards Steven Koester and Cameron Smith joined the staff in January and have put in long hours clearing out 27 acres of invasive species as well as controlling the first year of Spotted Lantern Fly on the property. Jaxson Mack, our new Conservation Director, arrived at the Nature Center in July. Together the team has been hard at work restoring the property by planting 100 trees and plants and working alongside 49 volunteers for a total of 273 volunteer hours. The team held several volunteer events this fall with an array of organizations, like Regeneron, who joined the Rye Nature Center for a successful day of planting. The Rye Reflect Space, an Eagle Scout project, was completed and provides a peaceful sitting area along our expanding Poetry Path.

There are many exciting conservation projects on the horizon. Our existing deer exclosure, which protects the understory from browsing deer, was damaged by a downed tree. The fencing is in the final stages of repair and a new deer exclosure will be completed soon to help encourage further understory regeneration.

Additionally, FRNC received a grant from Con Edison to help make updates to our trails. Planned updates include new trail markers to safely guide hikers through the forest and informative signage indicating different tree species on the property. We also plan to update the trail map to make it more user friendly and reflect any changes made to the trail system.

Financial Report: Fiscal Year 2021

Revenue and Expenses Summary

Fiscal Year (FY) 2021, which ended on December 31, 2021, marked the thirteenth consecutive year in which FRNC operated with a balanced budget. This report provides a summary of revenue and expenses on a cash basis and balance sheet results.

Revenue was \$2,192,666 increasing 54% from FY 2020. This reflects the increased enrollment in our outdoor programs and normal group capacities, as well as more robust fundraising with the return of an in-person Oktoberfest fundraiser. Expenses were \$1,761,624 in FY 2021, an increase of 33% over FY 2020. The expenses in FY 2020 were prudently managed because of the decreased revenue in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic. Additionally, FRNC invested in new educators and conservation staff to meet the growing program needs and help with the preservation of the 47-acres. The mix of expenses remained constant with approximately 65% going towards programming and conservation and 35% going towards operations, management, and fundraising. Net assets at year-end FY 2021 were \$2,439,536.

Liabilities decreased from \$386,952 to \$0 during FY 2021. The \$237,052 Payroll Protection Loan issued to FRNC in FY 2020 was forgiven in full by the Small Business Administration in April 2021. Additionally, FRNC paid off its Economic Injury Disaster Loan in full in March 2021.


As fiduciary stewards of the organization's assets, the Board and management staff of FRNC understand that responsible fiscal management is a critical obligation to the Nature Center, its donors, and the community. FRNC's President, Treasurer, and Executive Director are responsible for maintaining internal control over the financial reporting of FRNC and have designed and instituted such controls to provide reasonable assurance that financial reporting is accurate and reliable. This report was completed after the FY 2021 annual audit process.

*Other Revenue includes the \$237,052 PPP loan forgiveness.


Nature is for Everyone

Thanks to the Nature Access Fund, we have held sustainability workshops for senior citizens, helped the residents of the White Plains YWCA plant and maintain a vegetable garden, and brought hands-on science education to underserved children throughout Westchester and New York City.

We love to bring people to the Nature Center, and with our mobile, interactive NatureStation, we can also bring nature to them! NatureStation brings sustainability and conservation education to locations across Westchester. The Nature Access Fund exemplifies FRNC's mission of helping everyone, no matter age, ability, or background, take an active role in learning about and supporting our planet.
